The 3rd Sunday of Advent Year B; Gaudete Sunday



"Rejoice: The Lord is nigh." As Christmas draws near, Church emphasizes the joy which should be in our hearts over all that the birth of our Savior means for us. The great joy of Christians is to see the day drawing nigh when the Lord will come again in His glory to lead them into His kingdom. The oft-repeated Veni ("Come") of Advent is an echo

not only of the prophets but also of the conclusion of the Apocalypse of St. John: "Come, Lord Jesus," the last words of the New Testament.

Today is known as Gaudete Sunday. The term Gaudete refers to the first word of the Entrance Antiphon, "Rejoice". Rose vestments are worn to emphasize our joy that Christmas is near, and we also light the rose candle on our Advent wreath. Think of almost receiving a gift or a promised honor of your accomplishments but you don't know exactly what it is and you are almost there. You meet in the parking lot so many people all dressed up and excited and all heading the same venue of celebration. Your heart is full of joy and excitement but not yet complete. This is our feeling on the 3^{rd} Sunday of advent. Our Lord will honor us with a gift of his son when we arrive on the Christmas day but now, we don't exactly how. All we know is that it will be a beautiful celebration and joyful honor.

Christ Even Now on the Way to Bethlehem



Let's Learn About Mass Corner:

Part 2: Liturgy of Eucharist begins with presentation of gifts. Why do we give gifts to God? Does God need our gifts? The answer is No. The presentation of the gifts of bread and wine is giving back to God the gifts of creation and work of our hands. The beauty of this symbolism is enhanced when Christ's faithful process carrying these gifts and presents them to the Mass presider who receives them and goes with them to the altar and eventually presents them with a very beautiful prayer.

First, he raises the bread and says: Blessed are you Lord of all creation, for through your goodness, we have received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands, it will become for us bread of life...

Wine – Blessed are you Lord of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become our spiritual drink...

The presentation of these two gifts has a very strong backing from the Bible. In the Old Testament, when Abraham met Melchizedek the king of Salem and the priest of the highest God, he offered these gifts of bread and wine and in return, he received blessings. In the last supper, Christ offered bread and wine as his body and blood and he instructed us to do this in his memory.

In actual sense, God does not need our gifts. With or without them, God still remains self-sufficient. The offerings we make, helps us to join the sacrificial of God and thus unites us with Christ's own offering of self. Therefore in our presentation of gifts, we bring our entire life and our little sacrifice symbolized by the gifts of wine and bread presented to God by the priest on our behalf.

Another reason that we present gifts is to take care of the needs of the Church. The priest presents bread and wine on behalf of the people and in return the people present their other gifts of their labor in form of money and other things and both are joined together by the sacrifice of Christ on the cross.
