Feast of the Baptism of the Lord Sunday



Today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord. This brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves", He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world".

Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin. The mystery of Christ's baptism in the Jordan by St John, the Precursor, proposes the contemplation of an already adult Jesus. This mystery is infinitely linked to the Solemnities of the Lord's birth and the Epiphany that we have just celebrated, as in some ways it takes up and represents their significance to us.

The same Spirit, that descended on the water of the River Jordan wafted over the waters during the first creation (Gen 1:2). Therefore, the Baptism in the Jordan presents yet another truth: that Jesus has started a new creation. He is the second man (1 Cor 15:47) or the last Adam (1 Cor 15:45), that comes to repair the first Adam's guilt. He does this as the Lamb of God that takes away our sins. 'Looking at the events in light of the Cross and Resurrection, the Christian people realized what happened: Jesus loaded the burden of all mankind's guilt upon His shoulders; he bore it down into the depths of the Jordan. He inaugurated his public activity by stepping into the place of sinners' (Joseph Ratzinger, Jesus of Nazareth, Bloomsbury 2007, p 18).

From Fr. Vincent's' Desk: <u>Customs on the Feast of the Baptism of the</u> Lord

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In the many parishes of Kenya, the faithful gather in the front of the church where a tall cross made from pieces of wood is placed. Since there are no rivers near churches, a bucket is filled with water and is placed

in front of the tall cross. During special and very unique services the water is blessed and brought home by parishioners. This is taken in before breakfast is eaten. The same water is used to sprinkle on the land to be planted in the year, on the livestock, and seeds to be planted. The remains are kept during the year to keep the home safe from fire, lightening and sickness.

The priest then gives out his schedule of visits to his parishioners to bless their homes with the holy water that the New Year may be one of cooperation with the gift of God; His Son and the participation in the Life He has come to lead us in toward Salvation. This celebration marks the beginning of new life of Jesus coming to our homes with New year blessings.

Important reminder to EMHC (Extra Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion)

Starting from this month of January 2021, you can take holy Communion to the home bound and the sick in the homes on Sundays. We will give you the names of those you will visit once we confirm with them if they are comfortable. The nursing homes are still closed to outside visitors as of now.

Secondly, I would like to remind the EMHC on duty on Sundays that when you come to help me in distributing Holy Communion, Covid-19 guideline procedures require you to follow the following steps: first <u>receive Holy</u> <u>Communion</u> when you come on the sanctuary, then the next step is to <u>put on your mask</u>, followed by <u>hand sanitization</u> and then you can <u>take Holy communion to the congregation</u>.

2021 The Year of St. Joseph

From Dec. 8th, 2020—Dec. 8th, 2021, Pope Francis dedicated this year to St. Joseph the husband of Mary and earthly Father of Jesus Christ. Throughout the year, we honor St. Joseph as guardian and protector of the Church and the faithful. Since he is the patron saint of St. Joseph Church Wisner, we will celebrate this great Saint on his Feast Day during the Mass of May 1st, 2021 at 5 pm when we observe St. Joseph the Worker.

Mass Explained: Why we do or say that?

My Sacrifice and Yours, Are they two? After the precreation of the gifts, the priest says: Pray my brothers and sisters that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father. Why does he say "my" sacrifice and "yours"? Does it mean that we have two sacrifices? The "My" part of the sacrifice points to the sacrifice of Christ made by the priest who acts in the person of Christ. The "You" part of the sacrifice refers to the entire Church offering itself in union with Christ during Mass.

The people's response recognizes how both sacrifices of Christ's and their own will be united and offered to the father through the hands of the priest saying the Mass. So, the people respond with the words:

"May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, (priest's) for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of his holy Church".

In ancient times, people used to bring things for sacrifice such as a lamb without any blemish or a portion of their crops such as bread and wine. The prayer would be said for God to accept the sacrifice. The lamb would then be slayed and the crops would be burned as a sacrifice. The same format can be seen in the Mass. The Bible says the we bring to God our best of produce. Therefore, the bread and wine are just symbols but the best offering we give to God is ourselves that we might be changed into the body and blood of Christ. This helps us to be transformed and reborn in Jesus Christ. We ask that we too take part in Christ's resurrection. When you received the bread and blood of Christ, we become one with him.
