

The 3rd Sunday of Lent



He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the moneychangers seated there ... "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a market-place." His disciples recalled the words of scripture, "Zeal for your house will consume me (John 2:12-14)."

The first reading is taken from the Book of Exodus 20:1-17. When God had freed the Chosen People from the slavery of

Egypt, He led them to Mount Sinai. There he made a Covenant with the Israelites through which He promised to make them His own people, to lead them into the Promised Land, and to protect them from their enemies there. The Israelites were to reverence Him and Him only as their Lord, and they were to obey the moral and cultic laws which He laid down for them.

The Gospel is from St. John 2:13-25. St. John who wrote this gospel mentions visits made by our Lord to Jerusalem, He gave the "leaders of the people" in Jerusalem plenty of opportunity of hearing his message and his claims. He also worked some astounding miracles in or near the city.

On this particular visit as mentioned in today's gospel, he made it clear to them that he was someone special, someone close to God whose house they were desecrating, and whom he even called his Father. In hidden language he told them that they would put him to death but that that would not be the end, for he would rise again. But even the miracle of his resurrection did not affect the majority of them. They had made up their minds and "there are none so blind as those who will not see."

The reasons for their blindness were the same as those that keep millions of the neo-pagans of today from accepting and living the Christian faith. These, like the priests and Pharisees of Jerusalem in the year 28, are so immersed in the affairs of this world that they can give no thought to their own future. Their eyes are so fixed on the earthly objectives that they have set themselves, that they can see nothing else. The priests and Pharisees wanted more than political freedom from Rome. They had hopes that their Messiah would give them a great world empire, and with-it wealth and power without limit. Our contemporaries' aims may not go so far, but worldly aims are important enough in their eyes to make them exclude from their minds the thought of anything higher. Yet, they have more than enough reminders whichever way they turn to recall their minds to the historical facts of Christianity. This is 2006 A.D., that is 2006 years since the birth of Christ. Who was he, why was he born, why does the world divide its history into before he came, B.C., and after he came, A.D.? In every town and village of our once Christian western world there is a church or two with steeples pointing to the sky. Why? What do churches mean to men? Near every town there are cemeteries or "sleeping places," according to the meaning of that Greek word. Are those buried there only sleeping and waiting to be called, if not already called, or are they finished forever just like the ox or the unthinking cow that may be buried in the next field.

The agnostics and free-thinkers of our day should start to think about the real facts of life-the central ones of which are that Christ, who was the Son of God, took our human nature and lived for some time on this earth, so that

he would raise us up to sonship with God. He suffered crucifixion, because the world was full of sin when he came. But his death made atonement to the heavenly Father for all the sins of the world. His resurrection from the dead was the prelude and the guarantee that we shall all rise to a life of glory in heaven, if only we have followed him faithfully during our years on earth.

From Fr. Vincent's' Desk:

<u>RCIA: First Scrutiny of the Elect (3rd Sunday of</u>

Lent) This Sunday, and for the next two Sundays, we will celebrate the Scrutinies. According to the Church's Rites, "the scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good." Later this week, we will also "hand over" (traditio) the Creed to our catechumens, which they will then "hand back" at the Easter Vigil when they make their Baptismal Promises. Please keep all the Elect in your prayers as they make their final journey to the Easter Sacraments. Because we are celebrating the Scrutinies, the readings will be taken from Cycle A of the Lectionary for this and the next two Sundays.

Works of Mercy Envelopes

It is Lenten season and one of the themes is giving alms or helping the needs of others beyond our borders. The Works of Mercy collection will take place again during Holy Week. This envelope is in place of the individual special collections generally done throughout the year. We split these monies between the organizations listed on the front of the envelope. Since we do this collection only once per year, I kindly ask for your generosity.

To encourage everyone to be involved with alms giving during lent, Rice Bowls were sent home with students and are available at the back of church. Great things can be done in small acts. Rice Bowls will be returned during Holy Week and will go support Catholic Relief Services. You may place them in the offertory, or you may drop them by the church offices.

<u>Mass Explained: Why do we do that?</u> Today we look at Commissioning:

Announcements if any can be done here. Finally, we prepare to go back to that world in which we will live for the coming week. The burdens we have laid down at the door of the church for this Eucharist, we know we must now bear again—but now strengthened by this Eucharist and this community. There may be announcements at this time which remind us of important activities coming up in the parish. The priest again says, "The Lord be with you"-the ritual phrase serves now as a farewell.


Blessing and Dismissal. We bow our heads to receive a blessing. As the priest names the Trinity-Father, Son and Holy Spirit—we make the Sign of the Cross. The priest or deacon then dismisses the assembly: "Go in peace." And we give our liturgical "yes" by saying, "Thanks be to God." If there is singing, the Mass officially ends with the recess hymn.

Living the Eucharist in the world. We leave the assembly and the church building—but we carry something with us. What happens in our lives during the week gives deeper meaning to the ritual actions we have celebrated at Mass, whether it's family, work with poor or just plain work. It is only in relation to our daily lives that the full meaning of the ritual actions of the Mass becomes clear to us.


