### The 27<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time



And Pharisees came up and in order to test him asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of divorce, and to put her away." But Jesus said to them, "For your hardness of heart he wrote you this command-

ment. But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 'For this reason, a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.' So, they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder" (Mk 10:2-9).

The **First Reading** is taken from the Book of Genesis, 2:18-24, "So the Lord God cast a deep sleep on the man, and while he was asleep, he took out one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. The Lord God then built up into a woman the rib that he had taken from the man. When he brought her to the man, the man said: 'This one, at last, is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; this one shall be called *woman* for out of *her man* this one has been taken.'" This reading has been chosen to show the origin of the Church's teaching on the indissolubility of marriage.

The **Gospel** is from St. Mark, 10:2-16. On the "divorce" section of this Gospel see today's first reading. Christ clearly states that from the very beginning, God's plan for marriage was that it should be a life-long unity of one man and one woman. Its purpose is the procreation of children and their education, as well as the mutual love and fulfillment of the husband and wife. These demand this life-long bond. Divorce, which tries to break this bond, breaks the law of the Creator who decreed what was best for the temporal and spiritual welfare of the human race.

The last four verses of today's Gospel describe an incident which is in no way connected with the previous discussion but which has a very useful lesson for all Christians. It describes Christ's love for children and while manifesting this love he stresses the need for all his true followers to be childlike. "I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it." To receive the kingdom of God is to accept the teaching of Christ and live according to it in his kingdom on earth. He who does this will enter, after death, into the eternal kingdom of heaven. Christ says, however, that we must accept "like a child": his kingdom on earth, his teaching and the Church he founded to carry on that teaching. It does not mean: in a childish way, an unthinking, uneducated way, but in a child-like way—a humble, grateful, receptive way. A child is unselfconscious, content to be dependent on others' care and generosity. Christianity is a gift of the generous God to us; we have done nothing and never could do anything to merit it. We must accept it simply and gratefully as a gift; we could never deserve it.

While Christianity is a religion of reason and conforms in all its aspects to the rational nature of man—its basis is the revelation of God who is the author and foundation of all rationality—yet it is the heart of man rather than his intellect which Christ means to capture. The assent of the intellect to the doctrine revealed by Christ is not sufficient of itself for a Christian to earn the eternal kingdom; faith is the total acceptance and commitment of the believer to God through Jesus Christ. The man of true faith

commits himself to God with a filial childlike trust, assured that if he does all that he can God will do the rest.

**Religious Education**

**ST. JOSEPH – GRADES K-6**

The first grade is learning about Jesus, the Good Shepherd, and how much he loves us. They are talking about prayer and how it is both listening and talking to God. They also started making prayer chains. The 4th graders are learning about the saints and the path to sainthood. Each 4th grader is to choose and study a Saint and develop a presentation. The afternoon ended with all classes gathering in church to practice the song they will be presenting at the Youth & Family Mass on October 10th.

**ST. JOSEPH & HOLY CROSS (GRADES 7 -12)**

**Grade 7-9:** Since it was the Feast Day of the Archangels (Michael, Raphael, and Gabriel) we discussed that Gabriel means "Power of God" and was a messenger. Michael means "Who is God like and a warrior angel. Raphael means "God has healed" and he is a companion and healing angel. The angels do not have wings and are invisible unless God makes them visible to the person that they are helping at the time. Angels have free will. We then started watching "The World Trade Center" and the disaster of the twin towers on September 11, 2001. It shows the importance of family, faith and how the officers proved their dedication to help protect and serve others.

**Grade 10-12:** The students played an ice breaker game to start the evening. They discussed how to pray using ARRR (Acknowledge, Reflect, Respond and Receive). They started working on making cord rosaries and ended by doing the ARRR prayer and the Litany of Trust.
