

The 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C



*I Jesus told his disciples a para*ble, "Can a blind person guide a blind person?... Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye" (Luke 6:39-42).

The First Reading is taken from the Book of Sirach 27:4-7. The author was a wise and pious Jew who lived about

200 B.C. His purpose in writing was to encourage his fellow Jews to live devout lives following the Law of Moses and the pious traditions handed down to them. He treats of the individual, of the family and of the community, of their relations with one another and with God. In these verses he emphasizes how a man's speech shows up his character and his religious outlook.

The **Gospel** is taken from St. Luke (6:39-45). While we ourselves are blind to, or wanting in, many necessary virtues, yet we can spot this lack in our brother Christian and have the audacity to offer to lead him on the right road. We are often lacking in the basic knowledge of the teachings of our faith and yet we can find a thousand faults in the official doctrine of the teaching Church. We can all criticize minor defects in our neighbor's Christian behavior whilst our own Christian way of living is giving far greater scandal.

In other words, most if not all of us, are to some degree hypocrites. We pretend to be what we are not, but should be. We pretend to be producing good fruit: figs and grapes, whereas we are only thornbushes and brambles which produce nothing but harmful thorns which sting and poison ourselves and our neighbors. And while I am making these comments I shouldn't be at all surprised if some of my listeners are saying in their hearts: "Mrs. X or John Y is getting it today, I hope they are taking it in," when what we should all be saying is: "How truly our Lord read my heart. How many times in the past week have I criticized my fellow men without knowing all, or any perhaps, of the true facts. How seldom have I honestly examined my own conscience to see my own more serious defects and tried to correct them?"

When our Lord spoke these words, his purpose and intention was not to condemn his hearers, the vast majority of whom were guilty of the defects he mentioned, but rather to open their minds and their hearts.

It is for the very same purpose the Church has selected this particular lesson for us today. We are all guilty of rash judgment and unjustified criticism, to a greater or lesser degree. Let us turn this criticism on ourselves rather, and judge ourselves honestly and sincerely and in a short while we may, with God's grace helping us, notice a change in our Christian conduct.

From Fr. Vincent's Desk: Archbishop calls for Journey of Faith

You may have received a letter from the Archbishop about the Journey of Faith pastoral plan that the Archdiocese is embarking on in restructuring the way we work in our parishes and schools in the next 3 years to come. If you have not received it, you will soon. This plan is a result of our dwindling numbers of Catholics who are attending Mass weekly, especially in the rural communities and a big decline in vocation to priesthood.

A Journey of Faith is a pastoral plan to draw together Catholics from 23 Northeast Nebraska counties to create a new vision for how we, as a Church, will flourish in the future. As planning continues, parishes are encouraged to offer prayers about the coming changes in the Archdiocese.

Archbishop George Lucas invites Catholics on a three-year journey to meet the challenges of a changing world.

What's it about: Over the next 18-months, parish leaders, pastors and pastoral planners will work together to come up with new directions for parishes and schools.

Background: Our institutions and structures that served past generations so well were designed for different times. The parishes of the archdiocese need a sustainable approach that's more in tune with the times.

Why now: Current realities in the church combined with statewide population shifts pose challenges for the future. Most importantly, our own data tells us the majority of Catholics aren't experiencing their faith in a meaningful way.

Fewer than 1 in 4 Catholics attend weekly mass, a 20year downward trend.

The challenge is to see this as an opportunity, to have a deeper experience in the activity of the holy spirit, and to respond really in faith, and to trust God. Archbishop Lucas
