The 4th Sunday of Lent



Today is the halfway mark of Lent. This Sunday is known as Laetare Sunday for the first word of the Introit or Entrance Antiphon laetare (rejoice); it is a Sunday of joy. The celebrant has the option to wear rose colored vestments. Although we don't have adult catechumens preparing for baptism in our parishes, we usually perform a ritual called second scrutiny for them. It is a second step of

inquiring officially where they stand in their preparation to becoming full Catholics through the sacrament of baptism. This Sunday is our foretaste of Easter joy.

The **First Reading** is taken from the book of Joshua, 5:9, 10-12. Today's reading recounts the celebration of the Passover in the Promised Land by Joshua and those who had sojourned with him in the desert for 40 years.

The Gospel is from St. Luke 15:1-3, 11-32. This reading recounts the parable of the Prodigal Son, one of Jesus' most beautiful parables. It teaches us once more that God is a kind and understanding Father. The son who asks for his part of the inheritance is a symbol of the person who cuts himself off from God through sin. "Although the word 'mercy' does not appear, [this parable] nevertheless expresses the essence of the divine mercy in a particularly clear way" (John Paul II, Dives in misericordia, 5).

Mercy — as Christ has presented it in the parable of the prodigal son — has the interior form of the love that in the New Testament is called agape. This love is able to reach down to every prodigal son, to every human misery, and above all to every form of moral misery, to sin. When this happens, the person who is the object of mercy does not feel humiliated, but rather found again and 'restored to value'. The father first and foremost expresses to him his joy, that he has been 'found again' and that he has 'returned to life'. This joy indicates a good that has remained intact: even if he is a prodigal, a son does not cease to be truly his father's son; it also indicates a good that has been found again, which in the case of the prodigal son was his return to the truth about himself".

<u> Today's Catechism – Let's learn something about our</u> Catholic Faith

Chapter 12: Purgatory

What is Purgatory? It is a place or state of temporary punishment after death, for sinners who have damaged their union with God. In Mt. 12:32, we read: "Let anyone speak against the Holy Spirit and he will not be forgiven in the world or next.'

How do we know there is a purgatory? The Bible, the constant teaching of the church and even our own common sense prove that there is purgatory. ("Fire will test the quality of each person's work. If his structure stands up to it, he will get his wages. If it is burnt down, he will be the loser and through he is saved himself, it will be as one who has gone through fire. (1st Cor. 3:14-15).

How does common sense prove the existence of purgatory? Only people with mortal sin go to hell and no one enters to heaven with any stain of sin. Then there must be a place or reparation for people who fall in between with lesser offences and shortcomings.

Who goes to Purgatory?

Those who die while guilty of unrepented venial sins and those who die without having done sufficient penance to strengthen their union with God or their determination not to sin.

Is there suffering in purgatory for those who go there? Yes, they suffer its cleansing pains or purification.

How long does purgatory last for those who go there? No one knows. It is likely that it will depend on the number of and seriousness of the sins to be atoned for. (Mt. 5:26 Amen, I say to you, thou will not come out from it until you have paid the last penny".)

Where do you go when you leave purgatory? To heaven to be in union with God in eternal perfect joy.

Can you help the souls in purgatory?

Yes, we can help them by having Masses said for the souls, praying for them and doing good works for them. (James 5:17 The heartfelt prayer of a good man works very powerfully).

Does the Bible say anything about praying for the dead? Yes, we read that Judas Maccabeus sent twelve thousand drachmas of sliver to Jerusalem for sacrifice to be offered for the sins of the dead (2nd Macc. 12:43). "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead".

How can you avoid purgatory? Strive to avoid offending God and by doing penance for your sins.

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ST. MARY'S PARISH in West Point will have an up-close experience of the most studied artifact of all time – The Shroud of Turin, what many believe to be the authentic burial cloth of Christ. The Man of the Shroud exhibit will include 42 beautifully designed panels on display on the lower level of St. Joseph's Retirement Home (enter through the lower-level west door) from Wednesday, March 30-Sunday, April 3. Viewing Times: Wednesday, 8 am – 8 pm, Thursday-Sunday, noon – 6 pm. Also on display will be replicas of the Crown of Thorns, whips, nails, and Holy Sponge used in the Passion of Our Lord. This exhibit will raise the questions, "Could the Shroud be the most important archaeological artifact ever found? Does it provide clues to what happened during the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus?"

On <u>Thursday</u>, <u>March 31</u>, <u>at 7 pm at St. Mary's</u>, Shroud expert, **Jim Bertrand**, M.Ed. of the American Confraternity of the Holy Shroud, will give a special presentation and a rare viewing of a Shroud replica.
