

# The 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time



The First Reading is taken from the First Book of Kings 3:5, 7-12. God gives Solomon a choice of gifts. Solomon asks "an understanding God for mind," so that he could always do what was just and best for his subjects. God rewards him with the gift of wisdom making him the wisest man that ever lived.

The Gospel is from St. Matthew 13:44-52. The lesson of these two parables is as true for us today, as it was for those Palestinians to whom Christ spoke. All Christians are called on to imitate the two wise men, and surrender all their earthly possessions, if necessary, in order to gain eternal life. Does this "giving all" mean that we are all expected to abandon the world and take on the religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience? There are many who do just this. But it is not the only way, nor the normal way, to purchase the eternal treasure. Heaven is within the reach of all, who follow the ordinary vocations of life and partake of this world's joys and pleasures within the framework of God's commandments, but never lose sight of the goal toward which they are moving.

Keeping within the framework of God's commandments is the difficulty. We need not have a vow of obedience, but we must obey all legitimate authority. We may possess the goods of this world, but only such goods as we lawfully and justly acquire. Nor may we withhold all of these from a fellow man who is in need. We do not have to take a vow of chastity, but yet we must be chaste, we must use the gifts and the pleasure of sex only within the limits set down by God's wise laws.

Remember this: we shall not be asked at the judgment, "What did your neighbor do?", but "what did you do?" If we lose the pearl of great price in the eternity of happiness God has offered to us-it will not be the fault of others. The fault will be ours and ours only. We refused to pay the price. We did not think it worth the "paltry all" which we possessed in this life.

Having lived in the African background much of my life and now here in the United States for the last 12 years, I'm grateful for the variety of experiences, credible people and culture that I have acquired



and met. It took me long to adjust and learn but now I'm so enriched with all these blessings of making new friends and learning new things as well as visiting places that I had never been before.

With my little experience and mixed perspectives of life, I have learned three most important things: to be Patient, Appreciative and Joyful. Like many of you, my personality type is that of action oriented. There is always an inner speed of doing things inside me that drives what I do. Many times, I lack patience and end up being disappointed when whatever I want to do has not been accomplished. But my virtue of patience has really grown with time, especially since I came here. Culture shock was my biggest struggle. Many days I almost felt like giving up but my inner voice kept on telling me to be patient, it will be okay tomorrow. Indeed, that next day came and is still here and all is well despite the same impatience in other things too that still exists. I learned that patience pays.

Our American culture has taught me so much in terms appreciation. I'm saying this from my heart and not to please anyone. I won't gain anything by doing that. This is a very rich value that we have here that doesn't exist anywhere else in the world that I know of, especially at the level that we have here. There is a sense of appreciation that has been instilled in our American values that permeates across our nation and makes us so rich in terms of relationships. This appreciation is not only between the living but also the deceased especially those who sacrificed so much for our nation. I'm thinking of our annual family reunions, annual classmate get togethers, holidays in our nation to remember and appreciate our heroes both dead and alive, among many others. There is always a kind word of appreciation communicated to a soldier from even strangers whenever they meet on the streets or airports. Priesthood especially today is challenging but I'm always encouraged many kind people's sense of appreciation.

Can we find joy in everything that we do? As kids, yes, but adults sometimes we struggle with that question. That is why Jesus challenges us that unless we become like little children we will not enter into God's kingdom. But we are encouraged by great Saints like St. Paul and Mother Teresa who found some joy in everything that they did. St. Paul reminds us to rejoice in the Lord always and those that we love. This joy begins with a smile that is part of our American social values. When the world around you does not give you joy, go for it yourself and find it. It is there and pick it up. Our Catholic faith is one of the things that brings us joy and hope. Take a book and read about a Patron saint on anything and you will realize how joyful they were despite the odds they faced in their times.
